### PORTLAND STATE FAVORED IN 2008

Portland State has been chosen to win the 2008 conference title according to a vote by the league coaches. The poll marks the first time the Vikings have ever been favored in the preseason ... Portland State received five first-place votes for a total of 61 points. Last year, the Vikings won a share of the regular-season title and the right to host the 2008 Big Sky Championship for the first time in history. Newly-installed head coach Michael Seeman led Portland State to a 21-8 overall and 13-3 league record ... Sacramento State is picked to finish second, with three first-place votes and 53 total points. In 2007, the Hornets won their 11th-straight conference title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for just the second time in 16 years, with a win over Minnesota ... The battle for third went to Weber State, which barely edged out Eastern Washington. The Wildcats, who are coming off their most successful season in 19 years, earned 50 total points. The Eagles were picked to finish fourth with 49 points and one first-place vote. Eastern Washington begins a new era this year as former assistant Miles Kydd has stepped in as head coach ... Northern Colorado is predicted to take fifth place with 34 points in the poll. Montana claimed sixth place with 30 points, while Northern Arizona tallied 24 points for seventh place. Northern Arizona volleyball also begins a new chapter as head coach Craig Choate has taken over the program ... Idaho State garnered 12 points for an eighth-place finish and Montana State rounded out the voting with 11 points and a ninth place finish. The Bengals and the Bobcats welcomed new head coaches this season as well. Chad Teichert will lead Idaho State in 2008 and Sara Schaub is now at the helm of the Bobcats.

## BIG SKY TV

After two years as a pay service, fans around the globe will be able to enjoy action from the Big Sky Conference for free.

The league's video streaming web service will bring fans 49 football games in 2008, including every single conference tilt. Action begins on Thursday, Aug. 28 when Weber State plays host to Montana-Western.

The Big Sky Conference will once again partner with Broadcast International of Salt Lake City to bring fans all football, volleyball and men's and women's basketball games held in league venues. All told, more than 400 events will be video streamed in 2008-09.

On top of moving to a free service, the league member institutions, the conference office and Broadcast International have been working to make viewing easier and better.

All institutions will be required to provide Broadcast International two-camera shoots from the events. Watching archived games will be easier, as will watching live action.

Over the past two seasons, Big Sky TV has produced nearly 1,000 events, making it the most comprehensive video streaming site of any athletic conference.

## 2008 VOLLEYBALL PREVIEW

Big Sky volleyball underwent some major construction during the offseason. After the conclusion of the 2007 campaign, half of the head coaches in the league either resigned or retired. Now, heading in 2008, the conference welcomes three new coaches and two former assistants to its ranks of head coaches.

Idaho State's Mike Welch, Montana State's Miya Malauulu and Northern Arizona's Chris Campbell all stepped down from the post at their respective universities. Eastern Washington was under the leadership of Interim Head Coach Irene Matlock, who took over after the departure of Wade Benson for just one year. Additionally, the Big Sky lost one of its legendary coaches when Debby Colberg retired from Sacramento State after 32 years.

In Colberg's final season at the helm, Sacramento State went 29-8 overall and 13-3 in the Big Sky. The Hornets won their 11th-straight conference title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for just the second time in 16 years, with a win over Minnesota. The historic season was the perfect way for Colberg to close out her prolific career. She was named the Pacific Region Coach of the Year and was inducted into the AVCA Hall of Fame shortly after.

Now, for the first time in over three decades, the face of **Sacramento State** volleyball has changed. The Hornets begin a new era as former assistant coach Ruben Volta takes the reigns. Volta, who has been with the program for eight years, officially began his duties in December.

In this rebuilding year, the Hornets bring back just two starters. Lindsay Haupt, Michelle Franz, Missy Stidham, Jennifer Ferguson and libero Chelsea Goodsell were all lost to graduation. Those five players combined for 1,928 of the Hornets' 2,199 total kills. Haupt, a two-time MVP and three-time first-team selection led the Big Sky in hitting percentage with .354. Stidham, a transfer from Saint Mary's, put up impressive numbers from the beginning. She averaged 5.30 kills and 4.40 digs per game. Stidham was honored as the Top Newcomer, and Tournament MVP. She was also named to the all-region honorable mention team and the all-conference first-team. The outside

hitter garnered Big Sky Player of the Week accolades five times and became just the second player in conference history to earn AVCA National Player of the Week honors on Sept. 17, 2007.

Despite the voids left in Sacramento State's lineup, Rose Burke, Desiree Hoyum and Maddison Thivierge will help carry the team in 2008. Burke, who is one of three seniors on the squad, notched a conference-leading 12.61 assists per game last year and was named to the all-conference second-team. Hoyum, a junior outsider hitter made 24 starts on the right side. Thivierge, a sophomore, averaged 1.07 kills and 0.41 blocks per game. The Hornets have also added five newcomers to make up the roster.

Under newly-installed head coach Michael Seemann, **Portland State** went 21-8 overall and claimed a share of the Big Sky title with a 13-3 conference mark. Due to conference tie-breaking procedures, the Vikings earned the No. 1 seed to last year's tournament. For the first time in history, Portland State will host the 2008-09 Big Sky Championship in

Portland, Ore. on Nov. 28-29.

Portland State brings back a lot of talent to this year's squad. Nique Fradella, Jennifer Oney and Marija Vojnovic will lead the Vikings in their quest for a second straight regular-season title. In all, five starters return to the program. The Vikings only loss from the starting lineup is middle blocker and all-conference first-team selection Michelle Segun, who graduated in the spring.

Fradella ranked second in the conference in assists per game with 11.59. The junior setter also garnered second-team all-conference honors and was named the Big Sky Player of the Week on two occasions. Vojnovic, an outside hitter, led the Vikings' in kills with 3.32 per game and recorded a conference-leading 0.49 service aces per game. Oney, who is also a junior outside hitter, averaged 3.05 kills per game and was named to the Big Sky all-tournament team after recording 30 total kills (3.75 kpg) and four blocks in two matches. Vojnovic earned all-tournament honors as well for the Vikings. Portland State's only conference losses last season were at the hands of Sacramento State, Weber State and Eastern Washington.

The Eagles and the Wildcats finished in third and fourth place in the conference standings respectively. **Eastern Washington** continued its winning tradition by recording a 15-15 overall and 12-4 conference mark to place in the top three for the 12th-straight year. **Weber State** shook the Big Sky title race up as well, with a few major upsets. On Nov. 2, the Wildcats grabbed a 3-2 road win over Sacramento State to end the Hornet's 59-match Big Sky regular-season home winning streak, which dated back to Oct. 28, 1999. They also defeated Eastern Washington on the road in September, and Portland State at home on Oct. 18.

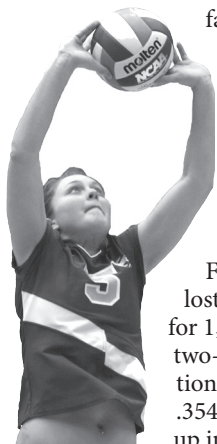
Weber State improved from a 5-11 league record in 2006 to an 11-5 mark in 2007. The Wildcats entered last year's tournament as the No. 4 seed and knocked off Northern Arizona in the quarterfinals. In the semifinals, they gave the Vikings a run for their money by taking the match to five games before dropping the decision.

Heading into 2008, Eastern Washington and Weber State both boast strong lineups full of experience. All six starters plus the libero are back for the Eagles, including Mandy Daniels, Hayley Hills, Alysha Cook and Chenoa Coviare. Also, Miles Kydd enters his first season at the helm of the program after four years as an assistant coach.

Daniels was tabbed the 2007 Libero of the Year after amassing 539 total digs and a 4.81 digs per game average. She received all-conference honorable-mention accolades and is one of two seniors on this year's squad. Hills was named to the all-conference first-team after averaging 4.38 kills and 2.54 digs per game. Outside hitter Cook also returns after a stellar freshman campaign, in which she notched 2.90 kills and 0.73 digs per game and garnered all-conference second-team recognition. Additionally, the Eagles have added six new faces to their already deep roster.

Coming off its best record in 19 seasons, Weber State returns all of its starters and eight letterwinners. Head Coach Al Givens is in his 16th year as head coach and is now the longest tenured coach in the Big Sky. Micah Folsom (formerly Lines), Brittney Bisailon and Chelsea Bair will all be back in action for the Wildcats this season.

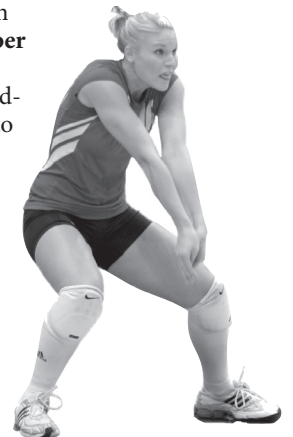
Folsom earned first-team all-conference honors and was the first Weber State player to do so in five years. She posted 20 double-doubles and averaged 3.38 kills and 3.42 digs per game. Bisailon was

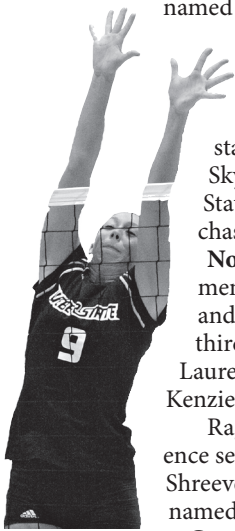

named to the all-conference second-team after posting 1.35 blocks per game. Bair was another asset to the Wildcats last year as she averaged 3.22 kills per game and received all-conference honorable-mention honors. With more starters returning than any other teams in the Big Sky, it's safe to bet Eastern Washington and Weber State will have a similar impact on the league title chase again this year.

**Northern Colorado** made its second tournament appearance in 2007 after going 10-20 overall and 8-8 in the Big Sky. Lyndsey Benson enters her third year as the head of the program and will have Lauren Carter and outside hitters Allison Raguse and Kenzie Shreeve back on the court this fall.

Raguse, a junior, was a second-team all-conference selection after tallying 121 blocks and 307 kills. Shreeve had 3.20 kills per game last season, and was named to the all-conference honorable mention team.

Carter split time at the setter position and notched 853 assists for the Bears. She is also the lone senior on this year's squad. Northern Colorado's key losses are libero Abby Mayne and outside hitter Dulcie Stone. Mayne average 4.29 digs per game and Stone posted 2.96 kills and 3.35 digs per game. With five starters returning, the Bears will undoubtedly be in the running for another championship bid.

**Northern Arizona** earned its first Big Sky Tournament berth since 2004 last year with a 7-9 league record. Now, the Lumberjacks look to continue that success under the leadership of new head coach Craig Choate. Choate, who brings 17 years of head coaching experience to the program, will rely on three returning starters and a libero for the upcoming season.

Brittany Stowers, Emily Osiadacz and Alex Fell are all back in 2008. Stowers, the libero, earned all-conference honorable mention accolades after averaging 4.99 digs per game. Osiadacz had a .312 hitting percentage and recorded 1.09 blocks a game. Two other seniors, Roni Greenwood and Kailee Savage may be out this season due to injury.

Northern Arizona's roster took another hit with the loss of Kim Babcock to graduation. Babcock notched 5.63 kills per game, which ranked first in the NCAA Division I. She was named to the all-conference first team and earned Big Sky All-Tournament honors. Setter Kelly Verboom and middle blocker Colleen Flooker also exhausted their eligibility last season. Verboom averaged 11.45 assists per game. The Lumberjacks welcome nine newcomers, including junior transfer Jana Mays-Robinson to help fill any voids in the lineup.

**Montana** just missed out on a championship bid last year after going 10-16 overall and 6-10 in the Big Sky to finish in seventh place. Head Coach Jerry Wagner returns five starters this season as he strives to clinch a berth to the Big Sky Championship. The Grizzlies lost Jackie White to graduation but bring in five newcomers, including freshman libero Brittney Brown. Jaimie Thibeault is back in action this year after being named the 2007 Outstanding Freshman. The middle blocker led Montana in blocks per game with 1.37. Also returning are junior Taryn Wright and seniors Lauren Gustafson and Jade Roskam.

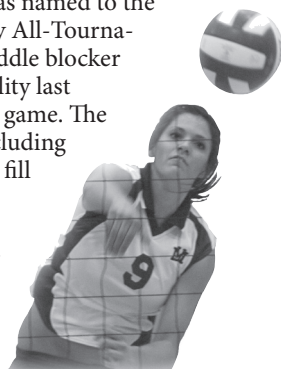
**Idaho State** is coming off a 6-23 overall and 2-14 conference record. The Bengals have made some coaching changes in the off-season and begin a new era under Chad Teichert. Teichert will have four returning starters, nine returning letterman and five newcomers

to work with in his first season at the helm. Blakely Peppinger, Emily Waldron and Charlee Kinghorn will lead the Bengals as they work to get back to the Big Sky Championship this year. As a freshman, Kinghorn posted averages of 2.75 kills and 2.37 digs per game. The middle blocker received all-conference honorable-mention recognition.

**Montana State** is also under new direction heading into the 2008 season. Sara Schaub, a former coach at MSU-Billings, took over as the head of the Bobcat program in Jan. In her first year with Montana State, Schaub will look to two seniors to help the team rebound from a devastating 1-27 overall and 0-16 league mark last year. In all, three starters including Nicole Grypiuk, Kaytlin Van Burger and Laura Viren will be back on the court. The libero Meghan Albiston is also returning and six newcomers help complete the roster as the Bobcats begin a new chapter in Montana State volleyball.

**2008 NCAA WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL**  
**RULE CHANGE PROPOSALS**

*The following rules-change proposals have been approved by the NCAA Women's Volleyball Rules Committee and by the Playing Rules Oversight Panel. The rule and page references are from the 2007 Women's Volleyball Rules Book.*

**Major Rules Changes**

Playing Area. (Rule 1.1, page 14) - All playable areas must be visible to team members and officials.

Non-Player Interference. (Rule 4.2.4, page 26) - In addition to the current language pertaining to media, spectators, or officials, interference by speed wipers or ball crew personnel will result in a replay.

Coach Position During Play. (Rule 5.2.4.1, page 28) - During play, coaches will be required to stay at least 1.75 meters from the court, and completely out of the substitution zone. An imaginary line perpendicular to the outside edge of the extended attack line indicates this distance.

Coach Position During Play (Rule 5.2.4.1, page 28) - Failure to comply with the correct coach position during play will result in a team delay.

Communication with Officials. (Rule 5.2.4.3, page 28) - The result of multiple coaches addressing the referees at one time will be an individual sanction. At the referee's discretion, the sanction may be given to the head coach (who is expected to be responsible for their staff behavior), or the second coach to approach (for failing to comply with the rule).

Terminology. (Rule 8.2, page 45 and throughout) - The term "game" will be changed to "set".

Points Required to Win a Set. (Rule 8.2.1, page 45) - The number of points required to win sets one through four is now 25.

Substitutions (Rule 11.2.2, page 57) - The maximum number of substitutions for each team is 12 per set.

Inadvertent Whistle or Horn (Rule 16.1.2, page 80) - Only inadvertent whistles or horns that affect play will result in a replay.

Protest Facts to be Recorded (Rule 17.2.4.6, page 83) - When a protest is lodged, the coaches will now be required to sign the protest documentation rather than the captains.

**Significant Editorial Changes**

Requests for Interruptions. (Rule 5.2.4.4, page 29) - A clarification will note that an improper request results when coach requests a substitution, timeout or line-up check from an area away from the substitution zone is an improper request (request denied).

Uniform Numbers-Trim (Rule 7.1.2.4, page 40) - If the shadow trim surrounding a number (rather than the number itself) is providing the necessary contrast to the jersey color, the trim must completely surround the number. Uniforms must comply by the 2011 season.

Logos and Insignia (Rule 7.1.3.2, page 41) - The requirement for identical team uniforms extends to commemorative or any special patch, logo, or insignia worn by team members.

Media Timeouts (Rule 11.1.3.1, page 56) - Media timeouts may be allowed at the host institution's discretion for broadcast matches with paid advertising (e.g. television, radio, or Internet audio or visual).

## 2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

### HORNETS WIN SIXTH-STRAIGHT BIG SKY CHAMPIONSHIP

Sacramento State beat Portland State in three games to claim its sixth-straight Big Sky title in Sacramento, Calif. on Nov. 24. It was also the ninth overall title in 11 years for the Hornets. The match was the final home match for 33-year Head Coach Debby Colberg, who resigned after the season ... En route to the 2007 Tournament Title, Missy Stidham notched 29 kills and 22 digs to lead the Vikings. The senior outsider hitter had a double-double by the end of the first game with 12 kills and 10 digs. She set a record for most kills in a three-game match and was named the Most Valuable Player for her performance over the tournament. The previous record was set by Northern Arizona's Tami Burchard and Cal State Northridge's Nancy Ma in 1996 ... Senior middle hitters Lindsay Haupt and Michelle Franz were named to the all-tournament team as well. Haupt had 14 kills and 10 digs, while Franz tallied eight kills and eight total blocks. Jennifer Ferguson added 20 digs and Chelsea Goodsell had 15 in the win ... For Portland State, Marija Vojnovic had 12 kills and 11 digs for the double-double. She was named to the all-tournament team along with Jennifer Oney, who notched nine kills. Michelle Segun had 11 kills and Erica Jepsen had 10 ... The Hornets beat Minnesota in the NCAA First Round.

#### BIG SKY TOURNAMENT TOP PERFORMERS

Sacramento State's *Missie Stidham* was named the Most Valuable Player after leading her team to its sixth-straight Big Sky Championship title. The senior outsider hitter, averaged 8.33 kills and 5.17 digs per game over the two matches. In the championship match against Portland State, she recorded 29 kills and set a tournament record for a three-game match. Stidham's total 50 kills over the tournament also tied for the sixth most in championship history.

Northern Arizona's *Kim Babcock* capped off a stellar career by knocking down a career-high 35 kills in a close, five-game loss to Eastern Washington in the quarterfinals of the Big Sky Tournament. Babcock also tallied nine digs and a career-high seven blocks while hitting .324 for the match. Her 35 kills ties the all-time Big Sky Tournament single-match record, set back in 1998 by Cal State Northridge's Nancy Ma.

*Lindsay Haupt*, of Sacramento State, hit .353 for the Hornets en route to the tournament title. The senior middle hitter also recorded a double-double against the Vikings with 14 kills and 10 digs. She had 24 total kills and two service aces against Eastern Washington in the semifinals.

Sacramento State's *Michelle Franz* averaged 3.00 kills and an impressive 2.17 blocks per game over the tournament. The senior middle hitter recorded 13 total blocks, eight of which came in the championship match. Franz also hit .643 against Eastern Washington and .441 in the two matches.

Portland State's *Marija Vojnovic* led the No. 1-seeded Vikings at the tournament. Vojnovic had 31 total kills and a 3.88 kills per game average. The sophomore outside hitter added 28 total digs and 3.50 digs per game in the two matches. Against Weber State in the semifinals, Vojnovic recorded four service aces.

*Jennifer Oney*, a sophomore middle blocker from Port-

land State, notched 30 kills for the Vikings over the tournament. She averaged 3.75 kills per game and added four total blocks.

Weber State's *Micah Lines* helped Weber State to its first tournament win since 2002 and only its second in 19 years. The Wildcats swept Northern Colorado in the quarterfinals and Lines recorded 11 kills, seven digs and six total blocks in the contest. Lines, a sophomore outside hitter, turned around later that day and knocked down 24 kills in a 3-2 semifinal loss to Portland State. She also added 13 digs and eight total blocks. Over the tournament, Lines averaged 4.38 kills, 2.50 digs and 1.75 blocks per game.

#### TOURNAMENT NOTABLES

Portland State entered the Big Sky Championship as the No. 1 seed for the first time in program history. The Vikings defeated the Hornets 3-1 in Portland, Ore. in their last matchup prior to the tournament to earn a share of the regular-season title. One week later, the Vikings and the Hornets faced off in the 2007 Big Sky Championship Match.

#### HORNETS FALL TO STANFORD IN SECOND ROUND OF THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

The Sacramento State volleyball team ended its season with an NCAA Tournament second-round loss to Stanford at Maples Pavilion. The Cardinal, led by Cynthia Barboza and Foluke Akinradewo, swept the Hornets in three games 30-23, 30-11, 30-28 to advance to the Sweet Sixteen to play Cal Poly.

Missie Stidham and Lindsay Haupt recorded 13 kills apiece for Sacramento State and Haupt had three blocks. Jennifer Ferguson had nine kills on a .320 hitting percentage and a match-high 14 digs. Michelle Franz tallied five kills and a solo block.

The Hornets defeated Minnesota 3-1 on Friday, Nov. 30 to pick up a win in the first round of the tournament for the first time since 1998. Sacramento State came back after losing 23-30 in the first game for a 30-25, 30-24, 30-17 victory.

Stidham led the attack with 21 kills and 14 digs, posting her 30th double-double of the season. Haupt notched 13 kills, a .308 hitting percentage and a team-best seven blocks. Stidham ended the season with 710 digs, which ranks second in the Big Sky single season records. Haupt, also a senior, concluded her career ranked second on the conference's total career blocks list with 616. She is also ranked 20th in career kills with 1,359.

#### BIG SKY ANNOUNCES

##### ALL-CONFERENCE VOLLEYBALL TEAMS

The Big Sky Conference announced its volleyball All-Conference team and individual award winners for the 2007 season on Nov. 20. The awards were decided following a vote by the league's nine head coaches. Eastern Washington's Hayley Hills and Sacramento State's Lindsay Haupt were unanimous selections to the first team ... Haupt was named the Big Sky's Most Valuable Player for the second time in her career. The senior middle hitter received first team honors for three-straight years and was a unanimous selection in 2006 as well. Haupt garnered MVP honors after leading her team to a 13-3 conference record and a share of the Big Sky regular-season title ... The native of Etna, Calif. also won the award in 2005 and was named the Outstanding Freshman in 2004, making her only the second player in conference history to win an individual award three times. Sacramento State's Kristin Lutes was the Libero of the Year in 2003, 2005 and 2006 ... Haupt led the league in hitting percentage with .359. Haupt was averaged 3.66 kills and 1.39 blocks per game last season and was named the Big Sky Player of the Week three times.

## 2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

Sacramento State also took home the Top Newcomer Award for Missie Stidham. The senior transfer led the Big Sky in double-doubles with 28 on the season. Stidham ranked second in the conference in kills per game (5.17) and fifth in digs per game (4.45). She was also second in the league in service aces with 0.45 a game ... Stidham, a native of Fresno, Calif., received Player of the Week accolades five times and tied the Sacramento State record for the weekly award. On Sept. 17, she became the second player in conference history to be named the Sports Import/AVCA National Player of the Week. Stidham led the Hornets to the San Francisco Invitational Title and an upset over then-No. 14 Cal Poly, while notching 6.40 kills and 5.20 dig per game in three matches.

### COLBERG NAMED PACIFIC REGION COACH OF THE YEAR

Sacramento State's Debby Colberg was selected as the 2007 Division I Pacific Region Coach of the Year announced by the American Volleyball Coaches Association on Dec. 5, 2007.

The regional recognition is the first for Colberg during the Division I era. She was named the Northwest Regional Coach of the Year in 1990, 1988 and 1986 when Sacramento State was a Division II school. In 1989, Colberg received accolades as the NCAA Division II Coach of the Year.

The native of Davis, Calif. retired after the 2007-08 campaign. She finished her final season at the helm of the Sacramento State volleyball program by leading the Hornets to their sixth-straight conference tournament title.

At last year's NCAA Tournament, Sacramento State advanced to the second round for the first time since 1998 with a 3-1 win over Minnesota. The Hornets fell to Stanford the following round and Colberg closed out her career.

In 32 years Colberg amassed a 828-292 record, which is the fourth most wins among active coaches. She has also led her teams to two national titles, 20 NCAA Tournament appearances, and 18 conference championships during her tenure. Colberg was inducted into the AVCA Hall of Fame in Sacramento on Thursday, Dec. 13.

### BIG SKY TABS COLBERG COACH OF THE YEAR

In her last year at the helm of the program, Sacramento State's Debby Colberg was selected by her fellow conference coaches as the Big Sky Coach of the Year after leading the Hornets to their sixth-straight tournament title.

Sacramento State went 29-8 overall and 13-3 in league play last season. The Hornets won a share of the regular-season title before claiming the championship and the automatic berth to the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

Under Colberg in 2007, Lindsay Haupt and Missie Stidham earned all-conference first-team honors and Rose Burke was named to the second-team. Senior middle hitter Haupt was the Big Sky's MVP and senior transfer Stidham was the Newcomer of the Year and the MVP of the tournament. Stidham, an outsider hitter, received Player of the Week accolades five times and became the second player in conference history to be named the Sports Import/AVCA National Player of the Week on Sept. 17.

Colberg, who has been honored as the Big Sky Coach of the Year eight times, will step down after 32 years at the head of the program at the end of the season. Since the program joined the Big Sky Conference in 1996, Colberg has led the Hornets to eight regular season titles (1997-01, 2005-07) and nine conference tournament crowns (1997-98, 2000, 2002-07).

Overall, Colberg has been honored 10 times as a league coach of the year in addition to being selected NCAA Northwest Region Coach of the Year four times. She was the 1989 AVCA Div. II National Coach of the Year.
